Chip's Chatter



I love the month of May. Spring has officially arrived and the long cold winter is behind us. We see trees starting to bud, flowers starting to emerge, the warm sun and the longer days. It is good time to stop and give thanks.

The other day I read a quote from the late Fred Rogers, of Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood fame. You might be surprised to know Mr. Rogers was an ordained Presbyterian Minister, ordained in 1963. His home church was in Pittsburgh, PA. The quote comes from an acceptance speech at the 1997 Emmy Awards. Mr. Rogers was being awarded the Lifetime Achievement Award. Here is a portion of his speech:

"Thank you. Thank you. Oh, it's a beautiful night in this neighborhood. So many people have helped me to come to this night. Some of you are here, some are far away, some are even in Heaven.

All of us have special ones who have loved

us into being. Would you just take, along with me, ten seconds to think of the people who have helped you become who you are. Those who have cared about you and wanted what was best for you in life. Ten seconds of silence. I'll watch the time.

[10 Sec Pause]

Whoever you've been thinking about, how pleased they must be to know the difference you feel they've made."

What caught my attention was "All of us have special ones who have loved us into being..... think of the people who have helped you become who you are." Many of us might think of our parents, perhaps an uncle/aunt or grandparent. As Mother's Day approaches, we might turn our attention especially to her. Sadly, there are some whose childhood experience may not have been so good. Perhaps a parent died at young age. Perhaps the family was split by divorce. Perhaps there was some form of abuse experienced. For these folks, they must dig deeper into their memories to find someone.... *who have loved us into being..... think of the people who have helped you become who you are."*

There are several types of "love." Ancient Greek philosophers identified [six forms of love](#): [familial love \(storge\)](#), [friendly love or platonic love \(philia\)](#), [romantic love \(eros\)](#), [self-love \(philautia\)](#), [quest](#)

[love \(xenia\)](#), and divine or [unconditional love \(agape\)](#). When we take this into consideration, we will find there are many people in our lives that fulfill what Mr. Rogers is talking about. Providing some kind of love towards us.

One thing I noticed about Mr. Rogers' speech was there is no length of time required of those who have loved us. I find it true in my only life. Many of the people who have helped me become who I am are no longer in my life. Some were only present for a very short time, others for several years. But their impact is still the same.

I have another observation. Mr. Rogers used the past tense, "loved." The Bible says that as we grow in our faith, we are continually growing to become more Christ-like. That means people continue to influence our lives and guide us and help us into becoming who we are and perhaps, will be. These people may only be in our lives for a short time, perhaps only minutes or hours, but their impact remains with us.

The speech also implies we are to pass this gift on to others. We need to be the people that love others into their becoming who they will be. It now becomes full circle. In so doing we develop a sense of humility and gratitude. We must also take the opportunity, when it is presented to thank those people who have influenced us or taught us valuable life lessons.

I obtained my Commercial Pilot's license in March of 1969, before entering the U. S. Air Force. During the flight check, the examiner simulated an emergency engine failure. The failure was not a sudden

engine failure but rather an engine in the process of failing. I passed the check ride.

Fast forward to March 1977. I was flying a single engine, single pilot fighter 100 miles Southwest of San Diego, CA out over the water. Suddenly my only engine began to vibrate and shake just as the simulated emergency from years before. The outcome was good. I was able to land the fighter at Miramar Naval Air Station (Top Gun) with a non-functioning engine. The engine seized immediately after I turned off the runway. The training I received in 1969 had a direct influence on saving a 28 million dollar fighter.

That summer I was home on leave and when directly to the man who had given me that check-ride back in March of 1969. I told him the story. I also told him HE was responsible for teaching me how to recover a stricken airplane. Harlan "beamed" for days. We must never fail to tell others of their impact on our lives.

As Mother's and Father's Day approach, let us not fail to remember the others who have helped us. We must also never fail to let them know what they have done for us. Let us not forget to give thanks to God for bringing them into our lives

and dance with the leaves

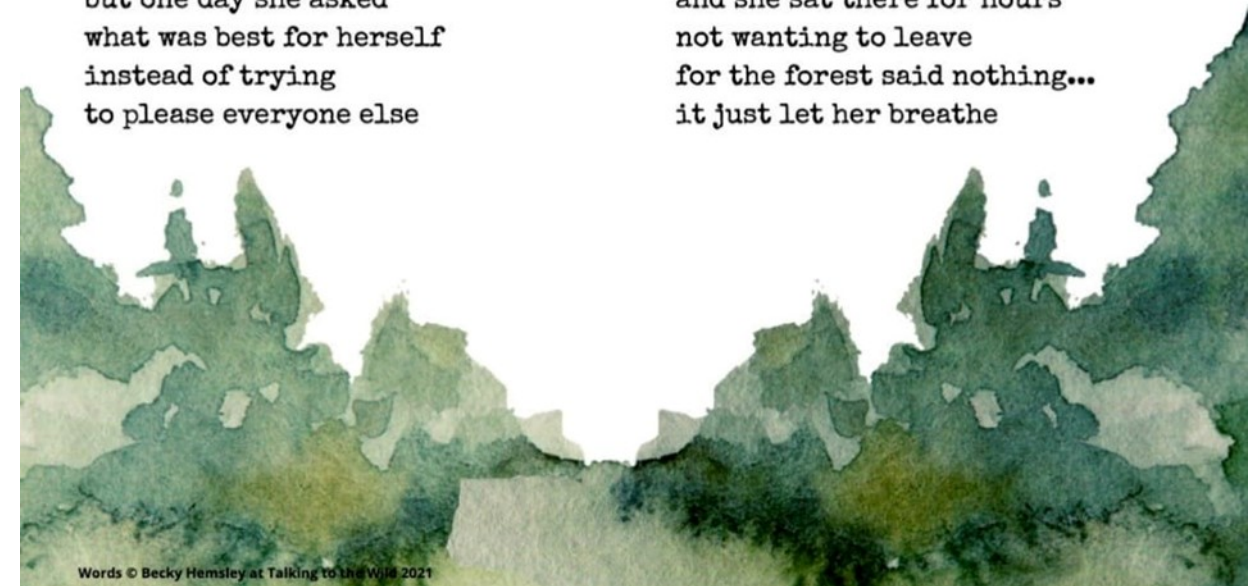
and she spoke to the willow,

MEMORIAL DAY

History of Memorial Day

The American Civil War of 1861 to 1865 claimed the lives of more than 550,000 people. During those years, many citizens began to place flowers on the graves of the war dead. Several Northern and Southern cities claim to be the originators of Memorial Day, but in 1966, President Lyndon B. Johnson pro-claimed Waterloo, New York, as its official birthplace.

In 1865, Henry Welles, a Waterloo pharmacist, suggested that the town formally set aside a day to honor those killed in the war. The following year, Waterloo held the first formal observance of a day dedicated to honoring the war dead.

In 1868, John A. Logan, a former Civil War general and founder of an organization of war veterans, extended the idea by suggest-ing May 30 as an annual date to remember the massive numbers who died during the turmoil of the divided nation. Called "Decoration Day," it is believed the date was chosen because flow-ers would be in bloom all over the country.

By the turn of the century, nearly every state had declared "Decoration Day" an official holi-day. After World War I, Decoration Day was expanded to honor those killed in all of the nation's wars, and after World War II, it became known as Memorial Day.

Watch for our local Memorial Day Celebration
